Let's talk ANIMALS... If one thing we know how to do well, it's that!

It's been a strange year. Abandonment rates have not been too high and the number of adoptions in Spain has been quite significant, which meant our shelters in Medina, Zamora, Palencia and Valladolid were fairly empty at the beginning of summer. But as the season went on, they started to fill up again. Once the pandemic was "over" it seems animals became dispensable once more. So we are back at full capacity (not bursting at the seams, but full) and we would like to encourage everyone to consider adopting, mostly our big dogs, which also deserve a good home.

What is crazy is the number of feline colonies and abandoned cats everywhere around us and the whole time. No matter where you go, this is a real issue, and the number of stray and abandoned cats is much higher than that of dogs, but the authorities turn a blind eye to it.

At Scooby we have a bit of everything, cats, dogs, horses, donkeys... And precisely because of that we need as much help as we can get. We are always involved in new projects, coming up with new ideas (all crazier than the one before) all with our animals' wellbeing at heart. In this newsletter, you will read about some of them; the Foundation, the solar panels, the hospital or the new analysis equipment. They will all benefit our animals' health and wellbeing. Next year, we intend to do routine

tests on all of our animals, something we recommend all of our adopters to do too.

This year has been especially hard for us. People who had been with us for a long time, left and we were also mercilessly attacked by people we would have never though would do such a thing. All this posed a lot of difficulties for us, mainly from a personal point of view, but we are now trying to recover from it all so that we can give our all to our animals, like we have always done.

Big hugs to all of you and just a reminder that we are still here (and hope to be for a long time) because of your support. Without you, none of this would be possible. You are simply the best!



three different ones) attracted them. Neither of the students expected Scooby to be the size it is.

Below are some extracts from what they told us:

"We (Alissa, Anna, Rachel and Laura) started our journey at Scooby the first week of July. We were the first group and did not know what exactly to expect. The first morning we met Irene, the local veterinarian. She showed us everything around and guided us the whole week. We learned a lot from Irene and she let us do a lot of things, what we are very greatful for.

Because of the heat and the sand, a lot of dogs were suffering from ticks, so we started vaccinating dogs

with Ivermectin, an anti parasitic medicine that also works against ticks. We also learned how to take

blood samples. Although we already knew 'by book' and on scaled models timw, which we of course enjoyed a lot!

We also had the opportunity to go to the veterinary clinic in Valladolid. There we could watch how some dogs were getting neutered. The last day, we may even assist a littlle with



some operations veterinarian Alfredo did, including an enucleation.

One day we found a kitten and we've managed to catch him, so he could get his

shots and get adopted to get the life he deserves. We also found a 'vencejo común' on the street. It was a small baby bird that fell off the roof because of the heat. Claire called a bird shelter for us, so we could





bring him there. Ofcourse, we all fell in love with the beautiful character of Greyhounds. It made some of us even want to adopt one from Scooby in the future. The little kittens stole our heart and every one of us had a favorite. We fed them every day and tried to give them as many love and cuddles as we could.

Overall it was such a great experience for all of us and we're all looking forward to go back to Scooby one day!"

Although they all came at different times, all assured us they had learnt loads during that week they spent with us. One of them even said: "We even have learnt more in a week than in two years of study"

Some of the girls (not all) found it a bit tricky to overcome that "wariness" they felt with some of our dogs — especially the loud ones — as they were not sure how they would react or behave towards them.

We only hope that they will return as volunteers some day, once they have more spare time in their hands... At the moment, their studies (a 6 year-long degree) take up most of it.

NEW INTERNATIONAL COURSES FOR VETS

AT SCOOBY

Following the collaboration of the BSAVA (British Small Animal Veterinarian Association) and later, that of Luis Sainz Pardo, who organised several courses for British vets at Scooby (see newsletter 26), it is now Andrea, a Portuguese vet residing in the UK, who has taken over that role.

This win-win project is designed to train and teach vet students how to sterilize animals (mainly spaying, but also castrating) and to perform other types of surgery that may be required.

The students benefit greatly as they gain hands-on experience that they would otherwise not have during their studies or even in their own clinics (for those who already work at clinics, sterilization requests are scarce and normally from private owners, but at Scooby, there are many dogs that need to be neutered so they can be given up for adoption). Both, students and teachers alike, benefit from these courses as they provide them with the chance to treat our dogs and also make use of our premises to perform surgeries (surgical equipment, machines, etc.).

ANDREA - THE COURSE COORDINATOR

After meeting Luis, Andrea, a qualified Portuguese vet residing in Scotland, decided to pick up where he left off, and started organising the sterilization courses herself.

Luis and Andrea coincided at Scooby in 2019 and she was able to learn more about the project and to do some "transition" training then. Sadly, no courses took place in 2020 due to COVID and travel restrictions, but she was finally able to organise 2 courses this year, one in September and another in December.

The courses cater to mainly two types of vets: those who are already in work (but with little to no experience in surgical procedures), and vets about to finish their studies. There are also some vets who have some experience but want to improve their skills. All are overseen by two teachers.

Andrea's job mainly consists in coordinating the courses, recruiting teachers and students, gathering vet equipment (which is one of the hardest and more important tasks) and logistics. She insists in finding good teachers who love to share their knowledge and perform surgeries.

In her experience, the students are always very satisfied with the courses, and she thinks it is important for them to create bonds and share experiences.

As for the shelter, Scooby is one of the biggest she has ever visited and is surprised by the size of some of the patios, which allows the resident dogs to play, run, etc. If I do say so myself, she insists on how welcoming and hospitable the staff at Scooby are. In fact, the course in December has not even taken place yet and she is already planning next year's.

JUAN. TEACHER



Juan is one of the two vet surgeons teaching one of Andrea's courses. He graduated from the University of León seven years ago and met Luis five years back, when he came to Scooby as a teacher for the first time. On that occasion, he had 10 students with which he performed between 100 and 120 sterilizations in one week. He came back to Scooby whilst Andrea was also here, doing her "transition" course. He believes it is very important for graduates (and vet students about to graduate) to be able to get practical experience, although from what he has seen, UK vet students have more chances to do work experience during their studies than Spanish ones.

His students were from different places and backgrounds. Two were Portuguese students that wanted to become surgeons, another two were already qualified vets who had been working at a laboratory for ten years but now wanted to go back to working at vet practices, others already worked at vet practices but wanted to hone their surgery skills... He likes that diversity in the group and mentions how quickly they progress: "We are there for a week. Monday and Tuesday we are always really on top of them, supervising what they do, but come Wednesday, we can always relax a bit as they learn very quickly. They just need to let go of their fear and trust their ability".

Juan is very kind and always willing to come whenever his schedule allows it. He moves around Scooby as if it were his home and helps staff in whatever ways he can, moving dogs who have just been operated on, bringing blankets, etc. "During my first course here, I kept having to ask the staff for things, but seeing how big their workload was, I learnt where everything was so I could carry out my duties without having to bother anyone". Trevor, the other teacher, always stayed with the students meanwhile.

He admits Scooby has "more vitues than defects", that he loves coming to do the courses and that it is important to have a Spanish speaker in the group so he can be the link between students/teachers and staff.

EVO. STUDENT

Evo is a Portuguese student residing in the UK. He graduated in Portugal and is one of the students that attended one of our courses to perfect his surgery skills. In his own words "the experience was amazing!" and totally worthwhile. He saw how his skills improved immensley from day one to day five. He also emphasizes just "how good the teachers are". He'd already performed a few surgeries at his workplace but never unsupervised, so he needed to dare "go solo" and now,



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as he proudly says himself, "I can operate on my own!"

He attended the course that took place this past September and was shocked by the size of the shelter. He also found our animals to be "in good condition" and when asked if he would return as a vet volunteer his answer was a clear: "Why not?"

During the December 6th week, Juan, Andrea and other 8 students came back to Scooby to give another course. Between the September and the December courses they realized more than 160 surgeries (basically they spayed female dogs), as well as other small chirurgical operations. The "win-win" projects are clearly a good solution to help Scooby!

SCOOBY HAS SOLAR PANELS!

Due to our high electricity bills and our limited resources, not to mention environmental factors, we decided to install photovoltaic solar panels on the roof of one of our buildings in order to be more self-sufficient energywise.

Apart from the financial aspect and the saving it entails, we also wanted to limit our carbon emissions and reduce our carbon footprint and comply with the objectives for a sustainable development.

Let us introduce you to Patricia, the person who helps us spread the word about our work on social media. She hates photos and will not allow us to share any of her, but doesn't mind us sharing one of her dogs! Sadly, one of them is no longer with her.

"My name is Patricia, I am 46 and live in Salamanca. I started collaborating with my local shelter in 2012. In 2015 they became in charge of the collection of Salamanca's stray animals and it was then that I met Fermín. Our shelter suddenly saw a huge increase in new arrivals and could not cope, so Scooby stepped in and took on some of our animals, one of which was a mare.

By 2017 I no longer collaborated with any shelters, but I wanted to help Scooby out somehow. Since I lived far and had little time, I thought something I could do was to publish photos of the dogs up for adoption on social media, namely, on Facebook. What I love most about my "job" is that, although I play a small part, the reward is huge because of the fact that, out of the hundreds of dogs that end up at Scooby shelters (whether in Palencia, Zamora or Medina del Campo), I know some have found forever homes thanks to a post I shared on Facebook.

He has been taken to see a neurologist in Madrid to try to get to the bottom of what's wrong, and hopefully improve his quality of life!

SCOOBY HAS OPENED A NEW HOSPITAL

On the 11th of October, Scooby opened a new ethical Veterinary Hospital in the village of **Santovenia** in Valladolid.

In this new hospital, we will be able to provide the same services as in our clinic in Carretera de Rueda 47, but on a larger scale:

- ⇒ Consultations
- ⇒ Vaccinations and deworming
- ⇒ Imaging Diagnosis (x-rays and sonograms)



- ⇒ Laboratory Analysis and Diagnosis Surgery (Sterilizations and other)
- ⇒ Laser therapy Magnetic therapy Dog and Cat
- ⇒ Grooming
- ⇒ Food and accessories

All profits will go towards helping the animals in our shelters.

The unemployed (proof required) will also receive a discount so they can carry on taking care of their pets!





INTERNATIONAL VOLUNTEERING AT SCOOBY VIA THE EUROPEAN SOLIDARITY CORPS AND THE ERASMUS+ PROGRAM





Three young Europeans completed a three month volunteering project at Scooby called "Volunteering against depopulation" via the Erasmus + Project and the European Solidarity Corps

Scooby has been a destination for volunteers from this program since its inception...

This Autumn, it was the turn of Ihnen (Germany), Terezka (Check Republic) and Enrico (Italy), to spend three months at the Villa de las Ferias in Medina del Campo. They were hosted by the Medina del Campo based organisation "deses3" who, once a year, and for five seasons running, have brought young people from different EU countries to carry out volunteer work at Scooby and other organisations such as ASCEDIS or Medina's City Council, as well as help out with some of the daily tasks at deses3.

The project, funded by the Erasmus+ Program and the European Solidarity Corps, provides these young people with a unique opportunity to come out of their comfort zones — even more so on a year like this one, amidst a pandemic — and to experience a truly enriching adventure that will teach them first hand what it is to be a "volunteer" and to recognise the European volunteering spirit as an element of cohesion and collaboration between countries.

Apart from their daily tasks, during their stay, the volunteers need to carry out a personal project which allows them to develop their skills and interests and which aim is to try to make an impact on the Villa de las Ferias and the community of Medina.

In order to be selected for this project, candidates need to send a cover letter, a CV and undergo an interview with the organisation's managers.

This teacher's aim was to strengthen her students' values of respect and kindness towards animals but also to use a different method of teaching.

number of parents, were finally able to meet Brisa in person (due to Covid, they had been unable to until then). The children's excitement could really be felt but also that of the parents', who could see just how much it all meant to their children!

A bit formally, they all went up to Brisa and petted and fussed over her. Naturally, she was over the moon! After spending time with her and dropping off the food they'd brought, the whole group was lucky enough to be taken on a guided tour of the shelter (which only normally happens on "open door days").

To this day, Brisa is still their virtual adoptee and we hope they will be able to carry on visiting her for many years to come...

Let Lindsa, the owner of Lotta speak about her:

"One year ago I adopted Lotta. She was a fearful and reticent dog. She was especially scared of men and it took her a long time to gain confidence. Interacting with other dogs was not a problem for her, same with cats and rabbits.



I work in a 'doggy daycare' and this means Lotta can come to work with me every day. From the very beginning she had contact with other dogs and socialised with her friends as they played together. I think this helped her immensely with her new start in life. Until June this year we had 2 dogs, Lotta and Lilly (also from Scooby). Lilly had a very calm demeanor and she was a fantastic role model for Lotta. Sadly Lilly became very ill and, with a heavy heart, we had to have her put to sleep in the summer. Lotta really missed her at first. She will eat only Lilly's food and from Lilly's bowl. Thank you for everything Lilly! We will never forget you.

I also have 2 horses and Lotta loves visiting the stables and roaming the meadow with them. She accompanies me when I ride.
